## **Nursery News**

### **Beginning of Term Assessments**

When we do return to greater normality, we'll use baseline assessments across the school to help us plan, intervene and accelerate pupils as necessary. The government is calling it a recovery curriculum. We have a huge advantage; our small class sizes and experienced teachers will be able to plug the gaps swiftly and effectively through informed assessment.

As all of the staff are preparing for the new normal, they've been researching new ideas and new initiatives in education. Learning from schools across the globe and keeping up-to-date with the safest ways to teach during a pandemic. One of the articles I read this week was on the benefits of the Ocarina as a musical instrument in schools. At St Peter's, I would like to make school as rich and fulfilling as possible and that includes ensuring we can offer numerous sporting and musical opportunities. # **Google Classroom**

All of the virtual classrooms will remain 'live' over the summer. There are lots of resources, lessons and ideas still on the platform which you and your child may want to access. The teachers however, will not be online and won't be marking work! I know that having these classrooms active may be useful for some parents over the summer break and the back catalogue of work is available to all. No new work will be set. We calculated this week that through 62 school days of lockdown, our children have submitted over 5000 maths and english activities, learnt over 9,000 spellings and we have hundreds of art projects, recorder recordings and a whole host of valuable learning experiences saved in these classrooms. We have all of this work secure and it won't vanish when the children move up a year group; teachers will still be able to access this amazing bank of work.

# **Reports**

This week, we sent out all our end of year reports. I hope you enjoyed reading them as much as I did. It's clear to see the dedication and commitment of our teachers in such detailed and personal reports. I hope they provide you with a comprehensive list of your child's achievements and targets and they're a useful tool for you to talk to your child about school. I know these reports were a labour of love and it's clear to read the connection our teachers have made with every child, even when we've been apart.

Nationally, all independent schools have seen a decline in pupil numbers.
